**IMPACT:** State & Local

**Summary of Legislation:** (Amended) This bill allows a person who is issued a citation or summons for hunting, fishing, or trapping without a license to (1) pay the conservation officer the fine and court costs; and (2) purchase from the conservation officer a hunting, fishing, or trapping license. The bill establishes a convenience fee, which is to be deposited in the Fish and Wildlife Fund.

**Effective Date:** July 1, 2007.

**Explanation of State Expenditures:** The bill provides that if a conservation officer issues a citation or summons to a person who hunts, fishes, or traps without a license, the person may immediately pay the conservation officer the amount due for the violation, plus a convenience fee of \$10. The person may also immediately purchase from the conservation officer a hunting, fishing, or trapping license at the price of the license, plus a convenience fee of \$10. The conservation officer must issue a receipt to a person who pays for a violation or purchases a license. The conservation officer must accept a credit card payment. If a person uses a credit card to make a payment, the conservation officer must charge an additional credit card transaction fee that is determined by the Natural Resources Commission.

The proposal may increase administrative expenses for the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). However, the DNR should be able to offset any additional administrative expenses with revenue generated by transaction and convenience fees.

**Explanation of State Revenues:** (Revised) Based on the number of citations issued in 2006, which was a total of 3,625, if every person opted to pay the conservation officer the \$10 convenience fee for immediate payment of the fine plus the \$10 for the immediate purchase of a license, the fees would generate \$72,500.

The bill could also increase revenue generated from the purchase of licenses. Convenience fee revenue would be deposited in the Fish and Wildlife Fund, which is used to finance the operations of the DNR Division of Fish and Wildlife and the Division of Law Enforcement.
